MONDAY. The day started with a leisurely drive to Gatwick with time to spare before boarding the 11.00hrs. Aer Lingus flight to Malaga. Nothing untoward during the flight which touched down on time at Malaga Airport. We cleared emigration and passed through Customs out into the Airport concourse where we found a little man holding up his notice for Mr Gordon Reeves. That's me I exclaimed. Ah hello Mr Reeves I have your taxi to Tamisa Golf.

I didn't realise just how far it was, about fourteen miles from the airport. We just sat back and enjoyed the ride, the scenery was beautiful. We arrived at the Hotel and as they say first impressions count. We were impressed. Although the Hotel seemed to be miles from anywhere we were overjoyed with the views we had from our balcony. We overlooked the pool and the Golf Course with the Mountains as a back drop, it was very peaceful and tranquil. We knew we were going to enjoy our time at this Hotel.

Unpacked and changed we made the most of the sunshine for the rest of the day. We met up with the Irish brethren and their ladies who had arrived a little earlier. They had the same thing in mind as ourselves to get as much of the sun as was possible.

Joan and I made for the Restaurant where we had a light dinner. The Menu was in English and was truly International but was a little pricey. **The food was good**. After a Spanish Measure of Brandy it was off to bed for a well earned nights rest..

<u>TUESDAY</u> was a free day, nothing to do except laze on the sun bedaround the pool and take a little golf viewing on board. Being a golfer I found it so easy to criticise the the stance, the swing and all those idiosyncrasies we golfers go through before hitting that little white ball. It was easy for me standing on the side lines but I would have loved to have had a round whilst we're here in Spain. I wasn't going to pay 75 Euro's for the pleasure, at least not while the exchange rate is almost 1 euro for the pound. Maybe next year.

More arrivals during the day, Elmars and Roma plus half of the Staffordshire Brigade and a few Yorkshire Terriors. These are the folk that support all our Gatherings. It was nice to greet them all once again. We continued our sun worship after lunch, unfortunately you have to keep moving the sun bed around the pool to avoid the shadows cast by the Hotel itself. My only criticism would be that the Hotel had been built facing the wrong way but then, who am I to criticise? Enough tanning for today time to relax on our balcony before showering and changing for dinner this evening. Dinner was once again a choice from the International a la Carte menu and with Twenty members of our Association dining together it was going to be enjoyable. The banter across the tables was up to the usual and expected standard. You really wouldn't believe that we had only been apart for six months since the last gathering in Londonderry. There was so many stories and tales to tell. It really was great to be amongst our dear friends again

WEDNESDAY dawned, David 'T' had arranged through the Hotel for our group to have a coach for the day. An additional day out to pastures unknown was the billing. After a leisurely breakfast we all assemble in the Hotel lobby to await the arrival of our coach. I'm afraid there were still a few thick heads from the night before but I'm sure we'll all make a quick recovery once we get going. "Where we going?" the cry went up. David, in a truly magnificent Yorkshire dialect announced. "Were going to a little town up in the mountains called RONDA. Well! You can imagine the laughter and banter that was forthcoming about a certain area in South Wales (Rhondda). The only difference was that in Wales its a Valley, where we were going was way up in the Sierra Nevada Mountains where earth reaches heaven.

The coach headed out of Malaga, passing all the new real estate, which isn't selling in the current financial climate, along this part of the coastline. After passing through Fuengirola we made for the mountains. Europe has certainly been good to Spain, new motorways everywhere, all paid for out of the EEC coffers under the heading Essential Re-generation. Our journey was to take about two hours, most of which was ascending the mountains via the winding roads, around hairpin bends, through dubious chicanes and passing some areas with shear drops of several hundred feet on one side. We clearly saw the remnants of several cars that didn't make it. Putting all that to one side, the scenery and the vistas were really spectacular, well worth holding our breath for as we journeyed up the mountain. Occasionally you would see the old cart-tracks which were once the only thoroughfares through these mountains and which are now being replaced by these Super Highways; highways literally. We arrived at what seemed to be quite a lively little town. The bus pulled into the bus station. Not quite a Victoria Bus Station as in London but never-the less big enough to service a vast area with cheap and assessable public transport. We were let off the leash for three hours to wander and roam at will. Wander and roam we all did. Some wandered into the nearest bar whilst others roamed the streets of this small but interesting town of Ronda. The town was big enough not to get lost in and small enough to have a tourist street just like Oxford Street which took us a good hour and a bit to explore. At one end the road led out of town at the other end was a small pedestrian square flanked on one side by the Bull Ring where the bull is killed every Saturday and from where the restaurants are supplied with fresh beef for Sunday Lunch. I told that it always used to be the practice that the bulls were immediately butchered after their day in the ring and the meat was them distributed to the poor of the city. I think I would get fed up with beef after a couple of weeks. I recall my own Children crying when Tommy Steele sang about the Little White Bull who wanted to be a Black Bull and to fight in the Bull Ring like all the other Bulls. They were too young to realise in Spanish Bull fights there is only one winner and it wasn't the Bull.

I think they are now mature enough to know what a sad and cruel sport Bull Fighting really is.. Across the Square directly opposite the Bull Statue is the Tourist Information Office, the Bank and the Police Station. It is from here that the Ronda Go Cart will take you on a leisurely ride around the Old Town for a small fee, 25 Es. The go carts are not the motorised type. They are just one horse power, and are only licensed for Ronda. Its one heck of a ride to the next town along these mountain roads, if they were ever allowed out of

Ronda. To one side of the Tourist Centre was a well laid out park, with all the usual facilities and lots of flowers in decorative gardens. It was through the Park to the Old Town, I didn't quite venture that far, but I did see **John Thomson** heading that way.

Having completed our shopping, which we swore we weren't going to do, but you know its for the grandchildren. We headed back to the Central Square for a beer and a coffee and to spend the rest of our time in Ronda just watching the world go by. The town of Ronda is miles from anywhere up in the mountains, but clearly it is very popular with the visitors and the tourists. Well! It has got a tourist Info Centre and a Bull Ring, but I certainly didn't see much more. The journey back to the hotel was just as hairy as it was on the way up. The only difference was the brake retarder on the coach was working overtime. It was very efficient. Again there were spectacular views on the way down, as we held our breath and plenty of cars that didn't make it in the ravines. Perhaps, being an ex Traffic Cop, I take things too seriously, but what a waste of a set of wheels, by missing the bends and driving over the cliff into the ravines. I don't honestly believe anyone would have survived had they been in the cars as they went over the top. I was glad and far more comfortable when we got back to sea level. Never-the-less the extra day out was well worth it.

Tonight we again dined in the Hotel. Some of the brethren decided to eat out and sample the local restaurants. As is almost the norm on such occasions we all met for a nightcap in the Hotel bar. **Just one?**

Wil and Heneke de Clercq should have arrived by 4.30pm this afternoon. Somehow Wil missed the turning in his hire car and took his dear wife on tour of the Costa del Sol. He eventually caught up with us at around 11.00pm. **Welcome Wil.**THURSDAY The official start of the EMA visit to Spain. Wil and Heneke were welcomed by all the brethren at breakfast. The rest of the morning was deliberately left free and by mid-day everyone should be here. Suresh Gupta arrived just after Breakfast. He was on the early flight having left home at midnight. Shirish Patel with his wife and Sister arrived safe and sound at midday.

A full House! Let the festivities begin. Everyone was now settled into the Hotel and all looking forward to an enjoyable week-end. At 4.00pm all the Brethren assembled in the bar area (where-else) of the Hotel, to meet our hosts for the rest of the day. The members of Lafayette Lodge No 50 under the Spanish Constitution, mostly ex-pats, were already there to greet us. By the time we assembled in the Lodge Room for our Meeting, the ice had thawed between us and we were all able to work with that Love and Harmony which distinguishes us from the rest of the popular world. This was only the third eeting of this Lodge since its reinvention, having only been re-founded and Re-Consecrated on the 16th of February this year.

The Lodge was duly opened by the WM and he extended a warm welcome to all the visitors especially the members of the EMA. The Meeting proceeded in the same manner and style as our own meetings back in the UK.

Mr David Pollack was initiated into Freemasonry in a very sincere manner by the Worshipful Master W.Bro Jack Nicholls ably assisted by all his Officers. The White Gloves were presented by 'yours truly'. The Charge after Initiation was delivered by the Senior Warden W.Bro Carsten Steiner in an enjoyable and sincere way. The Initiate Bro David Pollock, although he didn't know it at the time, was Initiated into our beloved Order in an excellent and most enjoyable manner. W. Bro David Tabner, our Assistant Speaker, expressed the thanks of the EMA in general for the way we had been received and welcomed by the members of Lafayette Lodge. He said "This is what Freemasonry is all about and long may it continue". He presented the Lodge with a cheque for 250 Euros to be used in any way the Lodge may decide. David also invited the Spanish Brethren to 'chat up' The Secretary for an EMA Joining Form. We will be delighted to welcome you all into our Association.

The Lodge Room was cleared and prepared for the Festive Board. The Brethren assembled and received the WM and our newly made Brother. Before settling into the Soup course, the Main was paraded before us Roast Suckling Pig with the proverbial apple in its mouth. It all looked fine to me. After the thoughts about that baby Pig had past we all without exception tucked into a hearty Festive Board. The usual courtesies and toasts were honoured and exchanged, W.Bro The V Rev Dr Peter Miln proposed the toast to the Visitors Dr Miln apart from being a man of the cloth was a very articulate speaker and a man of many words. His command of the English language was second to none and he was a wit. To witness such a tirade of the English Language was a privilege. Someone was going to have to respond. Unfortunately, before we had even sat down to dine I had agreed to respond for the visitors. How I wanted the ground to open up and swallow me. Follow that was a cliché which springs to mind. After a few suitable words of thanks from me we moved on and we were able to join our ladies for a night cap before retiring.

FRIDAY Day trip to the Rock GIBRALTAR

A, not too, early start this morning. The coach arrived in good time to pick us up and quite surprisingly everyone was ready for a day in Gibraltar. The coach meandered along the coastal road of the Costa del Sol. We seemed to have done this journey before this week. Not to worry the scenery is very pleasant. Although we are all now in the EEC it seems so futile that the Spanish refuse to put any signposts to Gibraltar on their roadways. There are none until you cross the boarder and cross the runway into the town itself. Ninety eight per cent of the population, voted by referendum, to stay British. By any standards that's a high percentage. Gibraltar is a little bit more than just the Rock. Its a deep water port and is still a Royal Navy Base used for running repairs to our ships. Being a Sovereign Base there is still a front line Garrison within the confines of the Rock and strategically it is clearly a listening station for the Med and Middle East. (Is that supposed to be a secret). Half the population are Military personnel. During the day the population is doubled by the workers crossing the Boarders from Spain. It is cheap to live in Gib. It is a Tax Haven providing you are prepared to live and stay in the Square mile or so that is Gibraltar. Crossing the boarder back from Gibraltar you will get checked and scrutinised by Spanish Customs Officers and pay you will if you have more than the due allowance.

Most of our party decided to take the afternoon bus tour up the Rock. It was well worth the twenty euro price tag. The well informed Driver / Guide was able to impart a wealth of information about Gibraltar's History and its inhabitants including the Apes, the only free roaming Apes in Europe. "The Rock" apart from being hollowed out by man over the centuries to make Offices, a Hospital, Living Quarters and Air Raid Shelters and even a Waterfall, there is also a natural Pulrassic Cavern with stalactites and stalagmites, (I can never remember what goes up and what comes down) which is open to the public. Well worth a visit. Then of course there are the Barbary Apes, never trust them, but for histories sake they are well worth putting on your "To See" list

. Our time in Gib was now coming to a close so we headed back to our coach for the return

journey to the Hotel. Our departure from Gibraltar was delayed by British Airways who at the very moment of our leaving Gib required the roadway to land one of their 747s. It was in all our interests to give way as the runway forms part of the roadway leading in and out of Gibraltar.

The Runway stretches out to sea on reclaimed land. The foundations were laid from all the rock dug out of "The Rock" when they tunnelled through it making all the facilities within.

The Quaich was circulated and the brethren partook of the Golden nectar sharing in true Brotherly Love.

4) The Meeting was opened at 10.35am by Bro David Tabner, our Assistant Speaker. He welcomed all the Brethren to Spain adding he hoped our gathering will be a memorable visit.

The Secretary read an E.mail from **Ian Benton** our Speaker. Ian wished everyone a happy time in Spain, he said he was sorry not to be with us this week but his previously booked holiday clashed with these dates. He promised not to let it happen again.
